LCDR John Austin Collett (1908-1942)

The USS COLLETT is named in honor of LCDR John Austin Collett (1908-1942). He was nominated to the Naval Academy from Nebraska; he was in the Class of 1929. Later, Collett went to Pensacola and became a Naval Aviator.

On 26 October 1942, Collett was the commanding officer of Torpedo Squadron VT-10; he died that day in the fierce battle of Santa Cruz in the defense of the Solomon Islands in the Pacific when his TBF-1 Avenger aircraft was shot down. LCDR Collett and Aircrewman Stephen Nadison Jr. were killed in the crash. (The third crewman, Tom Nelson, survived the war.) VT-10 flew off the USS ENTERPRISE (CV-6) which was part of Task Force 16 under RADM T.C. Kinkaid. Many details of the actions of that day are described in the cv6.org website.

There were 3 crew members of a TBF-1: the pilot, the turret gunner, and the radioman/bombardier/ventral gunner.

John Austin Collett was the older son of Austin Collett and Ruth Dahlman. John's younger brother James was also nominated to the Naval Academy from Nebraska; was in the Class of 1932. James became a surface officer. He was the Commanding Officer of the USS DAVISON (DD-618) in the Med when he learned that a destroyer was going to be named for his brother. James' request to be the first CO of COLLETT was granted; he was the CO from commissioning in May 1944 until the end of WWII. James' last duty station was as Commander of the Newport Naval Base in the 1960s.
